If students are unable to attend an examination they may be eligible for a derived grade. To qualify, in case of illness, a special form must be filled out by the Doctor (a medical certificate is insufficient). Please ring the school to gain details and collect a form.

Students sitting external examinations are asked to inform the College if there is any change of address between now and the end of the school year, so that the school can inform NZQA to ensure NCEA results can be sent to the correct address.

A SHORT GUIDE ON WAYS TO STUDY

- 1. **Practice, Practice –** Dan Carter just didn't rock up to a rugby field and kick conversions straight away he has spent hours and hours practising.
- 2. To pass external assessments you need to be **practising answering questions from past papers** set out in NCEA speak. There are great books available as study guides from shops like Paper Plus which have notes, past questions and answers all in easy to read format. Check out the study guide section in the bookshop. These books can be easily packed and worked on in the car or bus as you travel from place to place.
- 3. Listen to your teachers and attend all tutorials offered these are all published in the **Daily Notices**. Take along specific questions so you can get your understanding clarified.
- 4. **Write practice essays** and ask your teachers to mark them for you and give you feedback in subjects like English, History, Geography and Biology.
- 5. Use the **internet for study purposes** instead of Facebook.
 You can find materials like exercises, summary sheets, quotes etc from a variety of sources.

- 6. The **NZQA website** has past external papers and mark schedules that can be printed off and you can use them to answer questions. The more you do the easier it becomes as they pretty much ask the same thing just in different ways so the first time you answer a question it will feel hard but as you do more and more your confidence will improve and things will feel more achievable for you.
- 7. Try **turning the music off** we can all sing along to song lyrics but are we learning what we need to pass exams when we have TV or music in our ears at the same time?
- 8. Some ways of summarising key facts and learning them include
 - Flash cards (word on one side/definition or example on the other) Excellent for learning language features.
 - How/what/when/where/why tables
 - Write tables of advantages and disadvantages of a topic so you are ready to compare and contrast
 - Try writing answers in Science and Sports Science in a format like

IF you(do this).....THEN(this).....

happens.....BECAUSE.....

- Make posters to go on your walls, mirrors, toilet and or fridge doors use bright colours so the key facts and formulae if needed are in your face on a daily basis.
- Ask your parents to quiz you.
- Highlight key sentences in your notes.
- Create a mind map for different concepts with key information/dates/quotes/facts.
- Write **TEXAS** paragraphs. Make sure you link these back to the question.
- 9. In the exam, make sure you read through the questions fully and answer all parts of it. Read through exam questions and highlight key words. Work out the information you will need to answer the question properly.

ATHLETICS & CROSS COUNTRY

NZ Champs

Our year began with the NZ Secondary School Track & Field Champs at Waitakere Stadium in Auckland held over three days in early December 2016. We had a team of 7 athletes competing, most on debut. After Leah Belfield's amazing success last year we were up against it, but some very good results were achieved without actually grabbing a medal.

Leah stepped up to the Seniors for her first of three years. Making the finals was going to be difficult but in the end she qualified easily through her heats and semi-finals and finished 6th in the 100 and 5th in the 200m finals with all but one athlete ahead of her having represented NZ.

In the senior boys we had a number of strong performances. Cameron Collins was 2nd in his 200m heat but got eliminated in the semi-final. He was 7th in High Jump with only 3 guys jumping higher than him, and 5th in Triple Jump.

Hohepa Pereira was 3rd in his 100m heat but bowed out in the second round.

Head Boy Jonny Beaver ran the 400 & 800m. He missed the semis of the 400 by one place and was an easy winner of his 800m heat but then failed to make the final when some way off his best in the semis.

Logan Karl was 10th equal in High Jump just one height behind Cameron, and they both just missed the final 12 in the Long Jump. All four combined in the 4x100 and 4 x 400 relays and were 12th overall in both, but their 2nd placing in their 4x400 heat got the team excited.

Dylan Shaw was off the pace in the Shot Put and Discus in his first big event but better things would come later in the season.

In the Junior section Ethan Carter showed he has real promise qualifying through the first round of both the 100m & 200m. He was eliminated in the quarters of the 100 but made the 200m semis and missed the final despite running a PB.

Ruby Kirwan and Jaekob Jolly ran the Year 9 Road Races and the 800m and 1500m respectively on the track but didn't progress to the finals. Miss Pentney and Mrs Belfield (Board Chair) accompanied our coach Mr Green on the trip.

School Champs

The highlights were again provided by Leah Belfield who repeated last year's effort of breaking both the 100m & 200m records, this time in the Seniors. These records had stood for 34 years and were held by Shelley Fraser. They were the only records broken this year. Our Champions were:

Senior Girls – Leah Belfield (37), Anna Scott (24), Deanna Heke (16), House Relay – Cameron Senior Boys – Cameron Collins (34), Logan Karl (25), Hohepa Pereira (20), House Relay – Gorst Intermediate Girls – Katrina Amituanai (27) & Maria Muraahi (27), Jamie Hobbs (17), House Relay – Cameron Intermediate Boys – Jaekob Jolly & Ethan Carter (18), Flint Handley-Copp (14), House Relay - Cameron Junior Girls – Caitlin Fladgate (22), Grace Murphy (21), Manor Fleming (14), House Relay - Cameron Junior Boys – Luke Burgess (24), Tumanako Hunapo (17), Kylan Atkinson (15), House Relay - Gorst

Waikato/BOP Champs

This year there were no Zone Champs but 20 odd athletes went on to the Waikato Champs. Five Te Awamutu College athletes qualified for the North Island Champs by securing a top three finish. First season athlete Haereakau Tihi won the IG Javelin with a throw of 28.19 and also made the 100m final and was 8th in Long Jump.

Dylan Shaw won the SB Discus with a throw of 44.89m and was 5th in Shot Put. Cameron Collins was 3rd in both the SB 200m in 23.8 and the Triple Jump with 12.53m and 4th in Long Jump with 5.96m.

Logan Karl was 2nd in SB High Jump at 1.80m and was 5th in Long Jump at 5.88m and 6th in Triple Jump with 12.18m.

Katrina Amituanai was the 5th to qualify by gaining 3rd in the IG Shot Put with a throw of 10.93m but broke her toe at school and couldn't go to the NI Champs.

Others to just miss out included Ethan Carter who was 5th in both the IB 100 and 200m, Hohepa Pereira made both SB 100 & 200 finals and Tamara Wells who was 4th in the JG Discus and 8th in Shot Put. Leah Belfield was unable to compete due to torn ligaments in her ankle.

The highlight of the day came in the final event, the SB 4x100 relay. In a close race the TA team of Hohepa, Ethan, Logan and Cameron went in to the final change just behind Hamilton Boys High and St Pauls Collegiate, but with a super final change and last leg, Cameron Collins burst between the two 'big guns' to score victory for Te Awamutu College.

North Island Champs - Inglewood 7-9 April

Haereakau Tihi was the surprise package securing 3rd place in the IG Javelin with a throw of 32.64, a fantastic achievement in her first year.

Three others just missed placings. Cam Collins had a busy day with three events back to back. He started with the SB Long Jump where on his 6th Jump he tied for 3rd on 6m but then was pushed back to 4th on countback with his next best jump 5.94 against 5.95 for a Wellington athlete. He cleared 1.75m at High Jump for 6th place but withdrew without attempting the next height to protect a sore leg and went to Triple Jump where he was also 6th on 12.13m, a little below his best.

Meanwhile back at the High Jump Logan Karl cleared 1.80m and looked set to take 3rd until another Waikato athlete cleared 1.85 on his last attempt pushing Logan back to 4th. At the SB Discus a group of boys were locked in a tight struggle.

Dylan Shaw finished 5th with a throw of 43.87, less than a metre from 2nd. Unfortunately his one big throw of around 48m hit the side line and so it was a no throw.

Cameron was again in the action in the 4th event on his busy Saturday where he ran the final leg of the 4x100 relay. WaikatoBOP were trailing Auckland, who had a baton change problem, and this allowed Collins to surge through and take the victory for our team.

Leah Belfield

Prior to her injury Leah had been in great form at the NZ Track and Field Champs in March representing Waikato/BOP in the U18 grade. She took home four medals -3^{rd} in100m, 2^{nd} in 200m, 3^{rd} in 4x100 relay and 2^{nd} in the 4x400 relay. She was later selected to run for NZ at the Oceania Champs in Fiji where she took the bronze in the 100m, was 4^{th} in the 200m and won silver medals in the two relays behind Australia. She was subsequently selected for the NZ Relays Development Squad aiming for next year's World Junior Champs.

Cameron, Hohepa and Dylan also competed at the NZ Champs with Cameron placing 4^{th} in the U18 Triple Jump and Dylan 4^{th} in the U20 Discus.

Cross Country

Being held on a cool damp day in late May didn't prevent good sized fields taking part.

Junior Girls – Sam Dixon led most of the way to win in a time of 13.25 from MacKenzie Harris 13.49 and Caitlin Fladgate 14.10.
