# EXAMS AND ILLNESS/BEREAVEMENT ETC

If students are unable to attend an examination they may be eligible for a derived grade. To qualify, in case of illness, a special form must be filled out by the Doctor (a medical certificate is insufficient). Please ring the school to gain details and collect a form.

# CHANGE OF ADDRESS FOR EXAMINATION STUDENTS

Students sitting external examinations are asked to inform the College if there is any change of address between now and the end of the school year, so that the school can inform NZQA to ensure NCEA results can be sent to the correct address.

If students have clashes, they will be notified of arrangements made for them before they leave for Study Leave.

# Mrs Dickson's Study Tips:

#### Organise yourself a study timetable

- Google for examples of these.
- Divide it into half hour blocks.
- Don't plan more than one hour of study without a break. Your are aiming for quality time not quantity.
- Exam time is not cram time—if you hope to learn a terms work in a week, you're dreaming. Studying is you taking responsibility for your learning and your future.
- Be realistic, if you have sports practices, after school jobs or other commitments put these in first.
- Block out your favourite TV programmes, and any chores you have to do.
- Half an hour per subject per day (even when you have no homework) is a good way of keeping up with subject content. Even reading a novel from your reading list can count if you can't think of anything else suitable to do.
- Use your exercise books/folders as a resource—this is better than Google. Don't be afraid to highlight key words, quotes, formulae, dates etc. Perhaps transfer these into a notebook if that helps you learn.
- Organise a study space that is free from distractions. Work with family to find a suitable solution.
- Advertise your study timetable on the fridge and the bedroom door, so everyone knows the times you are unavailable.
- Try to be unavailable to your friends for these half hour blocks, eg no phone, cell phone, internet.
- Music may be helpful—this is different for different people.
- Treat the weekends differently—I suggest one evening off in the week and one day off in the weekends. Start your timetable at 10am on the weekend.
- If you miss carrying out your study routines, don't stress, just start again.
- A key may suit you eg colour Biology study blocks in green.
- Look for gaps in what you've planned in the evenings eg if tea isn't ready, then you could fit a subject in there.
- Have a gap between study and bed so your brain slows down.
- Don't put off what can be done now. The key to success is good organization.
- Attend any tutorials offered to you. Make use of the experts in the school..

#### Learning your notes

• Everyone has a different learning style. Have plenty of scrap paper available if you're a visual learner and need to draw and make mind maps/fishbone to summarise the content from your exercise books/folders.

#### Exam sitting hints

- If you become very stressed during formal exams, ask to be seated at the back of the room.
- Eat! Make sure you have something to eat before you sit an exam, even if it's a Smoothie or Up and Go.
- Check batteries in calculators. Made sure you have a spare pen of each colour you need, and a sharp pencil. Do this the week before. If your pen does run out, ask! The supervisor will get you a replacement. Get a clear plastic pencil case.
- Study your exam timetable carefully. Highlight the times you need to be at the venue. For NCEA exams, if you miss an exam, it's too late, there are no second chances. If there is a clash between two subjects, notify the school as early as possible.
- Try not to leave the exam room early. It's tempting to do so when your friends are leaving early. Take a big breath, settle down, and read your answers again. This could mean the difference between pass and fail.
- Involve your family/household in your hopes and dreams, so they can encourage you on bad days, and keep you on track.

# **ATHLETICS & CROSS COUNTRY**

#### **Athletics**

Our year started with the **NZ Secondary School Championships** in Dunedin last December. Unfortunately although the weather was fine, strong, cold and gusty winds made life difficult for most of the 1300+ athletes from more than 200 schools.

Our stand out performer was Head Girl from 2018, Leah Belfield, who won silver medals in both the Snr Girls 100m and 200m, losing the 100m by just 0.02 secs. She was an impressive winner of both her heats and semi-finals but she just failed to repeat her winning performances from 2015 when she claimed both junior titles. Leah finished College with 5 individual medals at this highest level which is a great accomplishment. She was further rewarded by being named in the NZ Sec Schools 'selected team' at the conclusion of the event.

Others to make the final in their field events (top 8) were first time attendee Deanna Heke who finished 8<sup>th</sup> in the Snr Girls Long Jump and Haereakau Tihi in the Snr Girls Javelin. Deanna jumped a 5.00m PB in one of the early rounds when many were recording 'no jumps' and put a scare into some of the favoured athletes. Slowly they reeled her in but 8<sup>th</sup> in a field of 27 was a nice surprise. She also competed in the Triple Jump and 200m. Haereakau was a little below her best in the tricky conditions but top 8 out of 22 entrants was still a fine effort. She also ran in the 100m and missed a semi-final spot by one placing.

A highlight for the TAC crew was the Snr Girls relay team qualifying for the 4x100m final. Coach Murray Green had coaxed Deanna into making the trip in order to put a relay team in for Leah's final year. Haereakau laid down the Javelin to join in, along with Yr 9 and first year athlete Sarah Hewlett. It took a super final leg from Belfield to get the girls through to 4<sup>th</sup> in one of three heats but they in fact qualified 5<sup>th</sup> for the final. In the final they finished 6<sup>th</sup> which was the best placing achieved for the school in at least 20 years.

Sarah was the busiest athlete competing in large fields in the Jnr Girls 100, 200, Long Jump and Triple Jumps. Though she couldn't make the finals she was close enough to suggest a bright future. The rest of the seven strong TAC team consisted of Joseph Abernethy in the Jnr Boys 1500 and Yr 9 3k Road Race, Jamie Day in the Snr Boys 100m and 400m and Jordan Ballie in the Snr Boys Shot Put.

#### **College Athletics Day**

The day dawned overcast with rain predicted later in the day. We decided to go ahead and despite one short downpour most events were completed. High participation meant Championship and Inter-house honours were keenly fought for with some very close results.

In the Juniors, the Boys points were shared around so much that nobody scored over 20. Dylan Chestnut with 19 prevailed from John-David Brown on 17. The Junior Girls saw Brooke Penny the winner on 26 from Emma Tetley-Jones on 24 and they were well clear of the rest.

The Intermediate section saw two clear cut winners. In the Boys Trent Brierley with 24 headed Tereanuku Tapsell on 17 whilst Sarah Hewlett dominated the Girls section with 24 despite the Triple Jump not being completed, from a determined Holly Harris on 19.

The Senior divisions often mean the last hurrah for many and the Boys sprints are always a keen battle. It took a photo finish to separate Cooper Fortis from Te Kapamanawakii Crown in the 100m final and in the end that determined the tile with Cooper on 25 edging Te Kapa on 24 and Taylor Morris close behind on 21.

The Girls was a very tight race with five athletes scoring 20 or more. Jamie Hobbs amassed 31 points from a strong all round effort. She only won one event to Iris Hut's three, but she squeezed home by 2 points with Iris scoring 29, a higher total than any other athlete on the day.

Selwyn won the Inter House battle with 1231 points. The competition was close with the four houses separated by less than 100 points.

#### **North Island Champs**

After qualifying by getting in the first three at Zone Champs and then the first four at the Waikato/BOP Champs, we had four athletes compete at the North Island Champs in Tauranga. This is high quality athletics and our four did fantastically well to all gain top 10 results.

#### Leah Belfield – a very special athlete!

Leah finished school last year but in her five years proved to one of the very best athletes to ever represent Te Awamutu College. Her highlight was winning the Junior girls 100and 200m NZ titles in Timaru in 2015, but in her final year won both events at the North Island Champs and then was second in both at the NZ Champs in Dunedin. Since leaving school she has gone on to win the NZ under 20 100 and 200m titles in Christchurch, was 6<sup>th</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> in the Australian Champs and then went to the Oceania Champs in Townsville where she repeated her 2017 effort at this international level by taking bronze in the 100m and being 4<sup>th</sup> in the 200m, and she was the leading runner in the NZ relay team which won gold. Her home stretch explosion was amazing. She broke numerous School and Zone records along the way, one of which was 65 years old.

Leah's reward for her efforts was securing a full scholarship to West Texas A&M in Canyon, Texas which she commenced in August, a very rare accolade for a NZ sprinter. We look forward to her competitions there starting with an indoor meet in December, followed by more in the New Year and then the outdoor season starting in March. Leah joins Laura Sinclair 2009 and Katherine Camp 2011 as previous scholarship winners from our school.

As well as her athletics she also represented us at Volleyball, Netball and Rugby. In Rugby Leah was a Waikato Under18 rep in her Yr 11 and 12 years but didn't play rep rugby last year to concentrate on her athletics. Of course she was also Head Girl last year and won an Excellence Award (the top gong) in the Multi Achiever category at the Waipa Youth Awards in June this year. Well done Leah.
